# Analytic Solution of the Dynamics of Malaria Transmission 

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#### Abstract

The dynamics of malaria transmission in a population is compartmentalized into the human and vector classes and represented by a set of ordinary differential equations using several known clinical and biological information. The Homotopy Perturbation method which provides solution to various linear and non-linear differential equations was applied to obtain the analytic solution of the model. The variational method was used for simulation to follow the trend of the population in the respective classes over a period of time. The result revealed the possibility of delimitation of the endemic disease through concerted effort.

## INTRODUCTION

Malaria is an ancient infectious disease with a 10,000 years of history (Hempelmann et al., 2009). It is originally from different species of Plasmodium ancestors, the disease was first found in three places: West Africa, Central Africa and South East Asia. (Mendis et al., 2001).

In the early period of the last century, the total population of malaria infections has reached a very high level with more than one half of the world's population at significant risk. Since the early 1950s, with the appearance of the effective insecticide DDT and medicines for malaria infections, the disease has almost gone into extinction in North America and most European countries. Presently, deaths caused by malaria mainly happen in Africa. Although, the disease incident rate is still high in India and Southeast Asia, the induced mortality rate is lower in contrast to that in Africa. The reason can be traced to the origin of malaria. The impact of the increasing frequency needs to be carefully evaluated, preferably by mathematical models. It is widely acknowledged that the models can play a crucial role in predicting disease dynamics. The Ross-MacDonald model is the earliest attempt to quantitatively describe the dynamics of malaria transmission at a population level. (Chitnis et al, 2006; Ross, 1992; McDonald, 1957). In this research work, the homotopy perturbation method is used to
find the solution to the dynamics of malaria transmission.

## METHODOLOGY

## The Homotopy Perturbation Method

The Homotopy Perturbation Method (HPM) was developed by ( $\mathrm{Ji}, 2000$ ). The HPM provides solution to various linear and nonlinear differential equations (Jiya, 2010).

The basic idea of the method is by considering the following non-linear differential equation:

Where A is the general differential operator, B the boundary operator, $f(r)$ is the analytical function and $\Gamma$ is the boundary of the domain $\Omega$. The A operator can be divided into two major parts $L$ and $N$ been the linear and nonlinear components respectively and (2.1) can be written as:

Where $V(r, P): \Omega \in[0,1] \rightarrow R \quad$ is an embedded parameter and $U_{0}$ is the approximation that satisfies the boundary condition. The solution can then be assumed as power series in $h$ as follows:

the rate of convergence majorly depends on the nonlinear operator A (V).

## DISCUSSION

Fig. 1.1 depicts sharp decrease in the susceptible population and increase in the infected class. These two segments of the population reached deteriorating levels at time $\mathrm{t}=0$. The initial population of susceptible almost shrinks to zero after the first year, only to be overtaken by the infected population. This is so because the treatment rate is very low as only slight increase in the recovered class is noticeable. Fig. 1.2 is a healthier population as far as the endemic is concern. The infected population diminishes faster over the period of time. Thought at the onset, the susceptible population is on the decrease but maintains steady state after time $t=0.2$. The recovered class is on the increase as a result of inflow from the infected class. In fig. 1.3, the population is significantly infected before attempt to fight the scourge. After time $t=0.4$, serious improvement is noticed with the susceptible and infected classes heading towards increase while the infected is almost wiped out at time $\mathrm{t}=1$.

## Conclusion

The Homotopy Perturbation Method was applied to obtain solution to the set of ordinary differential equations derived from the dynamics of malaria transmission. The variational method was also applied to obtain
the graphs from which future trend of the endemic is revealed. In this case, the transmission can be controlled. The research work further affirms the usefulness of the HPM in finding solution to a set of differential equations.

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
